Fair Registration Practices Report

Geoscientists (2016)

The answers seen below were submitted to the OFC by the regulated professions.

This Fair Registration Practices Report was produced as required by:

- the Fair Access to Regulated Professions and Compulsory Trades Act (FARPACTA) s. 20 and 23(1), for regulated professions named in Schedule 1 of FARPACTA
- the Health Professions Procedural Code set out in Schedule 2 of the Regulated Health Professions Act (RHPA) s. 22.7 (1) and 22.9(1), for health colleges.

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Qualitative Information

a) Requirements for registration, including acceptable alternatives

i. Describe any improvements / changes implemented in the last year.

In November 2016 our regulations were updated. The update delivered few significant changes, however the changes in the verbiage were made to promote an improved the comprehension of the legislation. As in prior years the steps for registration and the requirements are clearly indicated on the APGO website www.apgo.net. The most significate changes in the new regulation are surrounding Limited Members and the fee payment schedule.

In addition to the regulation change, the APGO has also introduced he following changes;

- -Streamlined the process for writing the Professional Practise and Ethics (PPE) exam, by allowing eligible applicants to apply directly with the facilitator when booking the exam;
- Prorated billing for Certificate of Authorization (CoA) Members.
- Increased the number of professional development webinars hosted by the APGO. The webinars have increased both in frequency and audience size.

As well as on-going regular review of the website itself.

ii. Describe the impact of the improvements / changes on applicants.

Limited Members:

The new regulation has lifted that restriction on Limited Members which required their work to be signed by another P.Geo. The new regulation allows Limited Members working within the scope of their limitation to sign their reports independently.

Professional Practise and Ethics (PPE):

New process for the Professional Practise and Ethics exam allowing members to register directly with APEGA has brought a new level of efficient to the examinees and simplified the exam process. Eliminating the need for members to apply to the APGO first, allows members more time to apply for the exam. Number of exams have increased from four to five per year and flexibility of three days instead of one.

iii. Describe the impact of the improvements / changes on your organization.

Limited Members:

Lifting the restrictions on the Limited Members was received well by the membership. This raised the profile of the APGO tremendously.

Professional Practise and Ethics (PPE):

Streamlining the process eliminated some administrative duties for the APGO and created others. The benefit to the examinees however far exceeds any additional administrative challenges faced by the APGO.

Verbiage in the new regulation has updated to provide readers with greater transparency to help them better understand what qualification we require for membership.

Section 23.1 of the new new regulation ON324/16 is a more stringent educational requirement for limited members than in previous years

- 23. (1) An applicant for registration as a limited member must meet the following requirements:
- 1. The applicant must hold at a minimum,
- i. a bachelor of science degree designed to be completed in three years, awarded by a Canadian university, or
- ii. a foreign credential that is equivalent in terms of academic requirements to a degree mentioned in subparagraph i.

International applicants where english is a second language should benefit most form this update in understanding how there expereince/education may translate in the Canadian system.

There has been no change to the membership annual dues. A \$30 administration fee for late payments has been removed completely. As per the new regulation unpaid memberships now have a 15 day grace period to pay their annual dues. As of the 16th day members will be suspended for nonpayment. Between the 16th day and the 75th day unpaid members can pay a reinstatement fee and have their suspension removed immediately. After 75 days accounts remaining in arrears will be revoked. Members wishing to practise after this would have to reapply as new members.

The APGO has introduced prorated billing for Certificate of Authorization (CoA) payments in the first year.

ii. Describe the impact of the improvements / changes on applicants.

Payment/Suspension:

The new regulation has provided a level of professionalism to the practice. Moving the suspension date from March 31st to January 16th was a surprise to some of the members had the following impact

- Increased awareness of the APGO
- Produced an opportunity to communicate with members about their membership and the benefits to being a member
- Signalled to the membership this was membership that you should protect and take pride in In addition prorated billing by month was enacted for Certificate of Authorization (CoA) Members. All CoA memberships will now expire on Dec 31st this will be the same time as individual memberships which will be easier for membership to remember.

Certificate of Authorization (CoA)

All CoA memberships will expire on Dec 31 to coincide with the individual membership's expiry date. This will make it easier for members to when their dues are payable

iii. Describe the impact of the improvements / changes on your organization.

Payment/Suspension:

Moving the suspension date for unpaid accounts to Jan 16th from March 31st allows the APGO is also better able to serve its fee paying members throughout the year with a reduced time and effort on individuals who are no longer interested in remaining members.

Introducing prorated billing for CoA's has not had an impact at this time.
